ood Pantry Notes The October food pantry again saw several new families in need. There is definitely an uptick food insecurity. After in serving 32 families, our shelves are really empty.

Thanks to the new storage facility at Norwescap and our local Foodshed Alliance, we were able to provide many different fresh produce for our patrons: apples, peaches, tomatoes, carrots, potatoes, yams, onions, 3 different types of lettuce, squash, and even some watermelons.



In November, we give out Thanksgiving boxes with canned and fresh vegetables the complete makings of a Thanksgiving dinner. We are short in large cans of yams, peaches (either 2 small or 1 large each), corn, and jellied cranberry sauce. We are planning at least 28 boxes at each pantry. Also, our supply on cereal is limited to Cheerios; some other types would be nice.

For a long time, Norwescap has not had any canned tuna in water and we are grateful for some of these as well Thank you for always being generous ot our pantry.


The distribution will take place at our church this year on Saturday, Nov. 18.

Handicrafts can spark appreciation for simple items. Weave this basket as a gift.



• Yarn (different colors)

What you do:

- 1. In the center of the plate, trace something round. Draw 9 lines (evenly spaced) from the circle to the plate's edge.
- 2. Cut along each line, stopping at the center circle. Trim more of the plate off so the cuts make a gradual V shape.
- 3. Fold the plate's sides upward to form basket sides. Keep these upright as you weave a bowl-shaped basket.
- 4. Begin weaving a length of yarn at the circle's base. Hold the end of the yarn in place as you spread the length over and under each side of the plate.
- 5. Switch colors to make a pattern. Keep the yarn tight as you weave up the sides.
- 6. To finish, bend down any remaining paper. Leave a tail of yarn and tuck it under a woven portion. Share your craft with a friend!


FPCB BOOK CLUB
